

# HANDS-ON ACTIVITY: OCEAN ZONES

## **OVERVIEW**

We are going to learn about the different zones of the ocean by creating a container with different layers of materials representing each zone.

## WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- **Container:** a mason jar (can use an old spaghetti sauce or pickle jar), vase, or any large clear (glass or plastic) container
- **5 items to represent the 5 ocean layers:** 5 sand colors; 5 food items such as beans, popcorn, rice, pasta; 5 party decoration items such as tissue paper, beads, marbles, etc.; 5 of any other items that you would like to use
- labels (could also use tape)
- sharpie or pen to write on the labels or container

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Distribute the containers and set out the 5 materials to be used as ocean zones.
- 2. Introduce each zone and ask students what animals do they think live in this zone?
- 3. Provide some examples of animals and adaptations they may have or have students do research to find out that information.
- 4. Begin adding to the container in this sequence:
  - a. Trench Zone (Hadalpelagic Zone)
    - b. Abyss (Abyssopelagic Zone)
    - c. Midnight Zone (Bathypelagic Zone)
    - d. Twilight Zone (Mesopelagic Zone)
  - e. Sunlight Zone (Epipelagic Zone)
